

Lawrence University 2017 Profile

Lawrence University is a residential liberal arts college and conservatory of music, both devoted exclusively to undergraduate education. It is a supportive academic community of 1,500 intellectually curious, diverse and multi-interested students from nearly every state and 50 countries—all committed to a rigorous and challenging educational experience.

The Lawrence faculty is devoted to *Engaged Learning* as the most effective way to prepare students for lives of personal fulfillment and professional accomplishment. It is a demanding approach to education for students who demand much of themselves. It is what characterizes a Lawrence education and distinguishes Lawrentians.

Using this engaging approach to learning, Lawrence helps students develop the abilities that are highly valued by graduate schools as well as employers. Among these are the ability to solve problems, communicate effectively, work collaboratively and thrive in a rapidly changing world.

Lawrence is located adjacent to downtown Appleton, a vibrant community of 74,000 in which the city and the college benefit from one another. The Fox Cities, a cluster of 20 cities and towns along the Fox River with a combined population of more than 250,000, is one of the fastest growing metropolitan areas in the state and has consistently been named one of the best medium-size metropolitan areas in the nation based on quality-of-life indicators. By car, Appleton is 30 minutes south of Green Bay, 90 minutes north of Milwaukee, two hours from Madison, three hours from Chicago and four and a half hours east of Minneapolis/St. Paul. The Appleton International Airport (ATW) is approximately 5 miles from campus and is served by Allegiant Air, American, Delta, and United.

CAMPUS

The 88-acre Lawrence campus is situated on a bluff overlooking the historic Fox River and contains 62 instructional, residential, recreational and administrative facilities. Adjacent to downtown Appleton, the campus is bordered on two sides by attractive early 20th-century residential neighborhoods. *Björklunden vid Sjön*, a 441-acre estate on Lake Michigan in Door County, serves as the college's northern campus, hosting curricular retreats and seminars for students each weekend throughout the academic year and continuing education seminars during the summer for alumni and the public.

Lawrence is a residential college, and more than 95 percent of all students live on campus in one of seven residence halls and other various types of small-group housing and apartment-style housing.

ACCREDITATION

Lawrence is accredited as a degree-granting institution by the Higher Learning Commission. The Conservatory of Music is an accredited institutional member of the National Association of Schools of Music.

ACADEMIC CALENDAR

Three 10-week terms (fall, winter, spring) comprise the academic calendar, spanning mid-September through mid-June. A normal course load for students is three six-unit courses each term (18 units). A minimum of 216 units is required for a degree.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

The program emphasizes extensive and deep learning through rigorous and engaged instruction. Instruction is given in a rich set of courses emphasizing small group or single-student tutorial courses, independent study projects, studio work and faculty-student research and scholarly collaborations. Nearly 90 percent of our recent graduates have had one-on-one course experiences. This emphasis on engagement is made possible by one of the lowest student-to-faculty ratios in the country (among the top 20). The university also offers a large number of interdisciplinary courses, emphasizing engagement with contemporary world concerns, and has extensive programs of off-campus study and community internships. Each student is encouraged to develop the capacity for self-direction and a concern for effective and ethical action in the contemporary world. All students begin their program with a nationally known *Freshman Studies* seminar course and complete their requirements with a student-centered *Senior Experience*.

Lawrence offers majors in traditional liberal arts disciplines and interdisciplinary programs; student-designed majors are also available. Within the Bachelor of Arts degree program, there are 35 majors, 40 minors and three interdisciplinary areas. Majors include anthropology, art (studio), art history, biochemistry, biology, chemistry, Chinese language and literature, classics, East Asian studies, economics, English, environmental studies, film studies, French, gender studies, geology, German, global studies, government, history, linguistics, mathematics,

mathematics-computer science, mathematics-economics, music, natural science interdisciplinary, neuroscience, philosophy, physics, psychology, religious studies, Russian language and literature, Russian studies, Spanish and theatre arts. Minors are offered in anthropology, art (studio), art history, biomedical ethics, biology, chemistry, Chinese, classical civilization, cognitive science, computer science, creative writing, East Asian studies, economics, education studies, English, environmental studies, ethnic studies, film studies, French, gender studies, geology, German, government, Greek, history, Japanese, Latin, Latin American studies, linguistics, mathematics, music, neuroscience, philosophy, physics, psychology, religious studies, Russian, Spanish, teaching ESL and theatre arts. Interdisciplinary areas, collections of courses addressing a particular topic, include innovation and entrepreneurship, international studies and museum studies. In the Bachelor of Music degree program, Lawrence offers professional study in music in four major areas: performance, music education, music composition or music theory, as well as a minor in music pedagogy. Students seeking the B.Mus. degree may also complete any of the minors, exclusive of music, or interdisciplinary areas offered in the B.A. degree program. Student-designed majors are also available.

The five-year, double-degree program allows students to earn both a Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Arts degree through a blended program combining professional study in music in the Conservatory with significant work in a non-music discipline in the college. Students must complete both a professional music major as well as a major in the college.

CONSERVATORY OF MUSIC

Established in 1874, the Lawrence Conservatory of Music is an integral component of a nationally recognized, exclusively undergraduate institution. Music students at Lawrence take full advantage of course work in the liberal arts and sciences, often pursuing double-degree programs and benefiting from the opportunity to work directly with senior faculty members across the disciplines. The Lawrence Conservatory of Music is committed to holistically preparing musicians for the challenges and rewards of a musical life in the 21st century.

FRESHMAN STUDIES

Entering students enroll in *Freshman Studies*, a two-course sequence specifically designed to acquaint them with the modes of inquiry characteristic of intellectual discourse at Lawrence and to enhance their reading, writing, speaking and critical-thinking skills. Through the study of important works of systematic thought or creative imagination, the course raises for discussion and analysis important ideas of abiding concern. *Freshman Studies* is both an introduction to and an integral part of a Lawrence education.

COOPERATIVE DEGREE PROGRAMS

Engineering (B.A./Bachelor of Engineering), with Columbia University, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute or Washington University; Forestry and Environmental Studies (B.A./Master of Forestry or Master of Environmental Management), with Duke University School of the Environment; and Occupational Therapy (B.A. or B.A./M.S.), with the Washington University School of Medicine.

TEACHER CERTIFICATION

Secondary-education certification, early adolescence through adolescence (Grades 6-12), is available for most majors offered in the B.A. curriculum. Early childhood through adolescence (Grades PreK-12) certification is offered in studio art, world

languages, ESL and music (choral, general and instrumental). Certification in elementary education, early childhood through middle childhood (Grades PreK-6), is available for all majors.

OFF-CAMPUS PROGRAMS

Lawrence encourages students to engage in at least one term of study away from the campus and offers 56 off-campus programs: eight domestic and 48 international. Nearly 40 percent of each graduating class will have studied abroad during their time at Lawrence. The college sponsors the Lawrence London Centre and the Francophone Seminar in Dakar, Senegal. Other programs are offered through Lawrence's membership in or affiliation with a variety of organizations, including the Associated Colleges of the Midwest, Associated Colleges in China, Institute for the International Education of Students and International Studies Abroad. Lawrence prioritizes long-term programs of a term, semester or academic year in length. Study abroad programs are offered for students in all academic areas, and students receive strong advising and administrative assistance as they consider their options, prepare for their program and upon returning to campus.

LIBRARY RESOURCES

Seeley G. Mudd Library is one of the finest small-college libraries in the Midwest, housing 412,595 books and bound periodicals; 193,116 government documents; 67,200 current periodical subscriptions; 21,075 music scores; 31,034 CDs, DVDs and other audiovisual resources; 103,113 microform items; 220,704 E-books; and subscribing to 171 databases. Special holdings include a rare book collection of over 3,400 items dating back to the 16th century and a Lincoln Reading Room containing published materials, works of art and autographs relating to the Civil War and Abraham Lincoln.

A founding member of the Midwest Conference, a member of the Northern Collegiate Hockey Association and a member of the Midwest Fencing Conference, Lawrence fields 21 varsity teams at the NCAA Division III level: 11 for men and 10 for women, including baseball, basketball, cross country, fencing, football, hockey, indoor track, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, outdoor track and volleyball.
