CLUBS AND ORGANIZATIONS

Lawrence strives to create a climate that is open and welcoming to students of diverse backgrounds. Many campus organizations exist at Lawrence for the purpose of promoting cultural interests and diversity. Others meet around shared interests, teach skills or provide opportunities for students to develop new interests. Still others exist to promote a particular cause, address a social issue or advance a political agenda. Most campus organizations host speakers and plan activities open to the entire Lawrence community. Students are invited to attend meetings, participate in programs and activities, and share in the life of an organization, whether or not they decide to join.

Afro-Caribbean Club (ACC)

The Afro-Caribbean Club serves as an avenue for students to preserve their African or Caribbean heritage, while educating the Lawrence community about the differences and similarities in the African and West Indian cultures present on campus.

American Civil Liberties Union Student Alliance at Lawrence University (AC[LU]²)

Affiliated with the ACLU of Wisconsin, AC[LU]² is a non-partisan organization that seeks to educate fellow students about the mission of the ACLU and to help safeguard liberties for students and the community as a whole. This group works with other campus clubs, other colleges and the regional and national ACLU.

American String Teachers Association–Lawrence Chapter (LU-ASTA)

The Lawrence University Student ASTA (American String Teachers Association) Chapter provides a link between LU string players and ASTA, the professional association for teachers of stringed instruments in public schools and private studios nationwide. It is a resource for performance and education majors alike because it involves both classroom teaching and private studio teaching. The LU-ASTA chapter brings clinicians to campus and organizes trips to conferences sponsored by ASTA. These events provide chances to network with leading professionals in the string education world. Outreach activities to educate the community about stringed instruments are also organized.

Amnesty International

Affiliated with the international organization of the same name, Amnesty International is a worldwide campaigning movement that seeks to promote the human rights embodied in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and other international standards. In particular, the group works to free prisoners of conscience; ensure fair and prompt trial for political prisoners; abolish the death penalty, torture and other cruel treatment; end political killings; and oppose human rights abuses by opposition groups.

Anime Union (LUAU)

Organized to explore and share interests in Japanese animation and Japanese culture, the Anime Club provides an informal Anime library, attends and promotes exhibits, and is working toward the development of an Anime Convention in Appleton.

Anthropology Club (Anthro Club)

The Anthro Club aims to further the awareness, understanding, appreciation and enjoyment of all things anthropological.

Appletones A Cappella

The purpose of the APPLETONES is to foster a sense of community and musical exploration through the coordination of outreach-based projects and musical events. The APPLETONES will work toward its goals by preparing for and holding public concerts, attending clinics and workshops in the area of a cappella music, entering competitions to showcase the group's accomplishments promoting the ideals of the University as a whole, and sponsoring student work.

Asian Student Association (ASA)

The mission of the Asian Student Association is to celebrate Asian culture on the Lawrence campus and in the Appleton community. Members strive to learn more about Asian culture through genuine conversation, engaging awareness campaigns and connecting with community resources.

Band Booking Committee (BBC)

The Band Booking Committee plans and organizes small-scale programs and events including bands and individual performers.

Black Organization of Students (BOS)

BOS brings together students of African-American heritage to educate the Lawrence and Appleton communities about the black experience through the celebration of black culture and progressive dialogue, as well as functioning as an academic and social support system for its members.

Bomb Squad

Members of the Bomb Squad promote service among Lawrentians and foster education in elementary school students by presenting shows to fascinate and stimulate young minds. Members create science experiments and, in particular, chemical reactions to entertain while making science accessible and fun. Membership is open to all students.

Campus Media Union (CMU)

Campus Media Union is built to promote student events. Filled with students aiming to serve the Lawrence community, CMU collaborates with student groups to make on-campus events exciting and well-attended. "We promote you."

Chinese Students Association: Chinese Dragon (CSA-CD)

Chinese Students Association: Chinese Dragon (CSA-CD) is a student organization set up to promote Chinese culture, including traditional arts, music and language. The Chinese Students Association: Chinese Dragon was founded in May 2010, and aims to play an integral role on campus. Its mission is to serve the needs of Chinese students and faculty; unite Chinese into a close-knit family; facilitate integration of Chinese students and faculty on the Lawrence campus, and support them in playing an active role in the Lawrence Community; raise awareness of the diversity represented by Chinese faculty and students at LU; vitalize Chinese culture on campus by sustaining and developing Chinese traditions, keeping current with trends in academic, entertainment and daily life; strengthen the bond between international students, Chinese students in particular, and American students by organizing cultural events.

Chronic Disease Support and Advocacy Group (ChronicLU)

The objective of ChronicLU is to provide a safe place where students can freely talk about chronic disease and how it impacts their lives, their campus and the surrounding communities. ChronicLU creates a support system through discussion and advocacy. Within the group, members will utilize information about different chronic diseases to gain a better understanding about chronic disease and to further empower each member's own interests. Respect, empathy, tolerance and confidence are the cornerstones of this group. Each participant builds a platform off of these cornerstones when addressing the topic of chronic health issues. The group's existence creates a presence on campus that will expand the community's awareness of chronic disease. Its major goal is to promote accurate and current information relative to chronic disease to transform affected communities.

Classics Club (CC)

Members of the Classics Club are a harmonious group of students with a passion for classics. The club seeks to promote the usefulness and importance of classical studies through language, history and art. There are no prerequisites to be a member of this club, but members are encouraged to participate in the Department of Classics, either by taking courses or participating in Classics Week.

CLUBS AND ORGANIZATIONS

College Democrats

The College Democrats organization provides a forum to express liberal perspectives and offers opportunities to meet with local, state and national political figures. Members often support various Democratic campaigns. The club also plays host to visiting candidates and encourages student voter registration and participation in elections.

College Republicans

The College Republicans organization provides a forum to express conservative perspectives and offers opportunities to meet with local, state and national political figures. Members often support various Republican campaigns. The club also plays host to visiting candidates and encourages student voter registration and participation in elections.

Collegiate Chapter of the Music Teacher's National Association (CMTNA)

CMTNA connects students active in, or interested in, private music teaching to the wider music teaching world. This community connects individuals to a national support group for private music teachers in their lives after Lawrence.

Conchordance

Concordance's mission is to provide an opportunity for the women of Lawrence University to participate in a small a cappella ensemble. In the community, this group is to be ambassador for music through outreach concerts in the area. On campus, this group will work to spread awareness of the diverse opportunities music can offer. The purpose of this group is to provide for its members an outlet for musical expression outside of the classical realm.

Confidence and Determination in Youth (CADY)

CADY's purpose is to instill confidence and determination in youth as well as promoting the liberal arts education. CADY holds events that bring local elementary students to the Lawrence campus to participate in education activities geared toward the liberal arts. One goal for CADY is to get children excited about a college education.

Creative Writing Club (CWC)

CWC provides an atmosphere for members of the Lawrence community to learn about writing and to share works with other members. Topics include prose, poetry, plays, graphic novels and any other areas of interest to members.

Dagorhir

K'lar is the Lawrentian chapter of the Dagorhir Battle Games Association, a group which re-enacts medieval style warfare with foam weapons in a fantasy setting. Members engage each other in combat games, and are encouraged to create their own weapons and fantasy personae.

Downer Feminist Council (DFC)

Downer Feminist Council is a feminist organization that invites all students to work together to identify, assess and address gender issues on the campus and beyond. Downer Feminist Council promotes gender equality through discussion, education and political action.

Ecology and Conservation Organization (ECO)

The purpose of ECO is to educate interested students about key issues and current events in the field of ecology and offer opportunities for Lawrentians to get involved with local conservation efforts. This will be facilitated through group discussions, guest speakers and field trips focused on various ecological topics including wildlife biology, fisheries biology, terrestrial ecology, aquatic ecology, animal behavior, restoration ecology, as well as conservation policy and management of natural resources, among other similar topics.

Electronic Music Club (EMC)

EMC explores the world of electronic music. Members attend and host electronic music concerts and festivals, compose and perform electronic music, and provide opportunities for recording and distribution of their work.

Film Production Club

This club seeks to provide an outlet for student video ideas to become products. The group welcomes all film styles in an effort to learn and improve production techniques and gain experience working with film and video.

GlamourGals (GG)

GlamourGals is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit whose mission is to inspire and organize teens to provide ongoing complimentary beauty makeovers and companionship to elderly women living in senior homes. Volunteering with the elderly is not always easy—many women that our teen volunteers spend time with are hooked up to oxygen tanks, are wheelchair-bound or have lost their ability to hear or speak. Our volunteers reach out—apply makeup, talk to them, listen to them, embrace them—to let them know they are beautiful, and worthy of their time. Our volunteers become the voices for these women, sharing stories with their peers after each GlamourGals makeover.

GlobeMed

GlobeMed aims to tackle the global challenge of the lack of access to health care systems by engaging and training students to work with grassroots organizations across the world to improve the health of the impoverished.

GLOW (Gay, Lesbian or Whatever)

GLOW is dedicated to enhancing and sustaining awareness of and support for gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender individuals and issues within the campus community. GLOW functions within both programming and outreach capacities. All are welcome at meetings.

Greenfire

Greenfire, Lawrence's environmental group, is dedicated to helping the environment on local, state and national levels. It is involved in activities to educate the Lawrence community about general and specific problems facing the natural world and also in taking action to rehabilitate damaged environments. Greenfire sponsors events, hosts speakers, runs a variety of campaigns and encourages both individuals and the institution to reduce environmental impact.

Habitat for Humanity (HFH)

The Lawrence University chapter of Habitat for Humanity interacts closely with the local Habitat chapter to provide affordable housing for people within the community. Members engage in building efforts, raise funds to help support local projects and participate in an annual spring break building program sponsored by the national organization. The organization is open to all interested students regardless of building experience or skill level.

Her Campus Lawrence (HCLU)

HCLU is a collegiate chapter of Her Campus, the No. 1 online community for college women. HCLU provides opportunities for Lawrentian women to contribute to www.hercampus.com/lawrence by writing about pop culture, style and the world around them. The stories are intended to be catchy, relatable anecdotes about what is happening in the "now." HCLU maintains an active membership with the national organization, and is required to submit weekly reports detailing the content, publicity and ongoing vision for the chapter.

Hi I'm Prov

Hi I'm Prov was established to spread the joys and benefits of improvisational theatre and its related forms to the Lawrence community and beyond through both regular performances and education. The group intends not only to provide entertainment but also to inspire artistic fulfillment, public confidence, self-understanding and effective collaboration.

Hillel

The Lawrence chapter of Hillel is broken up into three committees: the holiday/Shabbat committee, the study committee and the Israel committee. With these three committees Hillel gives Lawrence's Jewish community and the rest of the community a better understanding and appreciation for all aspects of Jewish life. Hillel provides Shabbat dinners, transportation to synagogue, guest speakers and leads discussions on various Jewish issues.

CLUBS AND ORGANIZATIONS

Hip-Hop Congress (HHC)

The Hip-Hop Congress provides the hip-hop generation and the post-hip-hop generation with the tools, resources and opportunities to make social, economic and political change on a local, regional and national level. Hip-Hop Congress is the product of a merger of artists and students, music and community.

Lawrence Assistance Reaching Youth Buddy Program (LARY Buddies)

LARY is a mentoring program matching Lawrence students with children in the community. LARY hosts activities that are educational and social. The program was named the 312th Point of Light in the National Points of Light program by former President George H.W. Bush.

Lawrence Baroque Ensemble

Comprised of interested Lawrence Conservatory student musicians, ranging from freshmen to seniors, the ensemble provides not only a venue for the study and application of historical performance practices facilitated by expert faculty, but also differentiated concert experiences for the Lawrence campus and greater community, unlike any existing experiences currently available in the area. Completely student-managed, Lawrence Baroque provides unique opportunities for students to control the artistic vision of the ensemble and also gain administrative experience. The manifold services provided to various constituencies, ranging from an enriched liberal arts experience for Lawrence University students to an enrichment of the cultural experiences available in the Fox Valley area, provide opportunity for the Lawrence Baroque Ensemble to flourish, achieving its mission of inspiring passion for Baroque music while providing access for all.

Lawrence Bird and Nature Club (LBNC)

LBNC fosters an appreciation for the natural world through bird-watching and other forms of observing nature. The club promotes the study, enjoyment and conservation of wild birds. It also raises environmental awareness through trips, meetings and local excursions.

Lawrence Christian Fellowship (LCF)

Lawrence Christian Fellowship is affiliated with Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship and is an organization for all students interested in the Christian faith. Fellowship is offered weekly in addition to Bible studies. The group also arranges transportation to area churches, temples and mosques and hosts discussions of faith issues centered on articles and readings.

Lawrence Film Club

The Lawrence Film Club selects a series of films each term for the enjoyment and enrichment of the campus community. Film showings are free and open to the campus. Members learn how to operate projection equipment, market and produce film showings, and share their interests in films.

Lawrence International (LI)

Lawrence International aims to help international students adjust to life at Lawrence and in Appleton, to provide a forum for international and domestic students to meet and engage in conversation, and to provide programs on world issues for Lawrence and the Appleton community. All interested students are welcome to attend meetings.

Lawrence Intriguing Current Events (LICE)

The mission of Lawrence Intriguing Current Events is to educate members and the Lawrence populace about current events; to reach out to political groups in the community and get Lawrentians interested and involved; to analyze world and local events and understand their affect on individuals and the world around them; and to learn how to carry on a passionate debate with grace and civility.

Lawrence Rowing Club (Crew) (men and women)

Crew is a fall and spring club sport, although indoor practices are organized during the winter. People with all levels of experience can join. Each season the team competes in several regattas in 4-person and 8-person boats.

Lawrence Swing Dancers (LSD)

The Swing Dancers meet each week to teach and enjoy swing dancing. Members often host dances for the campus community and sponsor formals and other social events. The club also sponsors trips to regional festivals and competitions. Instruction assures that everyone can participate.

Lawrence Symphony Orchestra Social Activities Committee (LSOSAC)

The main purpose of the Lawrence Symphony Orchestra Social Activities Committee is to promote social interaction among the musicians of the LSO and the campus community. This purpose is accomplished through post-concert receptions and seasonally appropriate activities. The committee is composed of volunteer members of the LSO. The hope is that with adequate planning and enthusiasm, the gap between the college and Conservatory will be bridged by these events.

Lawrence University Club Lacrosse (LUCL)

LUCL works to promote the game of lacrosse on the Lawrence campus through healthy relationships, physical activity and competition.

Lawrence University Computer Science Club (LUCS)

The Lawrence University Computer Science Club exists to provide a constructive outlet for computer-related interests of Lawrence University students, and acts as a hub for those interests. Through LUCS, students can find involvement in software development projects, programming competition, electronics workshops and coding tutorials, all with the benefit of a greater organization and centralization of these activities.

Lawrence University Gaming Club (LGC)

Lawrence Gaming Club provides a community for gamers on campus. It is dedicated to creating an inclusive, fun, friendly group for any Lawrentians who share a passion for card, board, video games and beyond.

Lawrence University Geological Society (LUGS)

The Lawrence University Geological Society encourages participation by all students interested in geology.

Lawrence University Meditation and Mindfulness (LUMM)

LUMM's purpose is to encourage/allow people to be more peaceful and centered through meditation, and more aware through mindfulness.

Lawrence University Model United Nations (LUMUN)

The Lawrence University Model United Nations is dedicated to promoting awareness of political and economic international affairs, both on the campus and in the community, and to promoting awareness of the United Nations, its procedures, and role within the world. Members participate in Model United Nations competition both regionally and nationally.

Lawrence University Pre-med Chapter of the American Medical Students Association (AMSA)

The purpose of this organization is to provide an environment that supports the creative ideas of physicians-in-training. AMSA serves as a forum for discussions of health issues and develops policy agendas. AMSA also promotes and maintains programs that enhance the quality of health care in the community.

Lawrence University Printmaking Club (tHINK)

The goal of tHINK is to provide a venue for students to increase awareness of, and provide access to, the unique medium of printmaking.

Lawrence University Quiz Team (LUQT)

The goal of this club is to advertise Lawrence University at other Midwestern universities and to provide an opportunity for Lawrence students to enjoy trivia year-round.

CLUBS AND ORGANIZATIONS

Lawrence University Russian & East European Club (LUREE)

LUREE welcomes students interested in Russian and East European culture, politics, language and history. Members meet to discuss topics. Programs include film exhibitions, presentations and lecture/discussions.

Lawrence University Society of Drama

The Lawrence University Society of Drama strives to create an open community where all aspects of theatrical production can be unified into a cohesive whole, and where people can find a sounding board for ideas, a proving ground for artistic creation and a network of allied artists.

Lawrence University Unitarian Universalists (LUUU)

The purpose of LUUU is to provide opportunities for spiritual growth and social action among members of the Lawrence University community who support Unitarian Universalist principles and values.

The Lawrentian, published since 1884, produces weekly issues and includes news, opinions, features, sports, arts and entertainment.

LUFix

LUFix is a network of people with a desire to learn to fix life's everyday problems, a curiosity for creative solutions, and a willingness to have a greater ownership of their lives. The community facilitates interaction between those with the skills, knowledge and resources to solve problems with those eager to learn.

LU Magical Organization of Students (LUMOS)

LUMOS is a philanthropic group that centers around the love for Harry Potter. It provides fun, stress-relieving, and of course, magical, events throughout the year including: the Yule Ball, quidditch matches, movie marathons, Great Hall feasts and competitions for house points.

LU Sacred Harp (LUSH)

Sacred Harp music is a form of a cappella congregational singing from the American South. LU Sacred Harp is a nondenominational student group which meets weekly to sing and learn about Sacred Harp music and the traditions of Sacred Harp singing.

LU Taijutsu Club

LU Taijutsu Club was formed to teach and promote the Japanese art of Taijutsu. It is open to all members of the community. Topics of study include basic awareness, street smarts, safe ways of falling, strikes and throws, rolling, pressure points, evasion, flexibility and practical meditation.

The Magpie–LU Thrift Store

The Magpie is a student-run thrift store that collects donations to organize and sell to the student body and interested staff and faculty. Profits go for environmental causes, decided by store leaders every term. In addition, the Magpie aims to promote awareness about both environmental and human rights abuses that go along with the current clothing consumption model of the modernized world, and to provide students with an alternative in order to show how feasible modifying those consumption habits can be. It also aims to promote the longevity of this and related lifestyle choices through educational campaigns and promotional materials.

Massive Movement (MM)

Massive Movement allows students to learn, practice and dance in hip-hop styles. It also presents choreography and student works to the Lawrence community.

McCarthy Cooperative House (Co-op)

The members of the McCarthy Cooperative House seek to extend the principles of a liberal arts education into the living environment. Members work cooperatively to prepare meals, care for their residential facilities, budget, plan programs and activities, and provide service to campus and community. The group usually embraces environmental and social justice issues, prepares organically grown foods, and purchases in a socially responsible manner. All students may apply to participate in the cooperative.

National Association for Music Educators (NAfME)

NAfME helps prepare future music educators for changes, advancements and improvements in the field of teaching music.

Outdoor Recreation Club (ORC)

The Outdoor Recreation Club is an organization for the adventurous at heart. Outdoor Recreation Club plans ski trips, backpacking and camping trips, and many more events that are open to the entire Lawrence community at very little cost. Outings are open to both novices and those experienced in wilderness skills.

People for Animal Welfare (PAW)

People for Animal Welfare promotes awareness of animal rights issues and animal welfare. Members engage in political debate, participate in demonstrations with the Animal Welfare League, sponsor campus educational programs and discussions, and work with the local Humane Society.

Photography Club

Students interested in developing their photographic skills are welcome to participate in the Photography Club. Members sponsor and attend exhibitions, help one another to improve their photographic and darkroom skills, and enjoy social activities.

Prescribed Escape Productions (PEP)

Prescribed Escape Productions is an independent, student-run theatre company aiming to provide Lawrence and the surrounding community with thought-provoking, well-produced theatre.

Psychology Students Association

The Psychology Students Association aims to provide information to the Lawrence community by sponsoring speakers and holding seminars on psychological issues.

Sailing Club

Sailing Club is dedicated to providing members of the Lawrence community with the opportunity to learn and practice safe and proper sailing techniques. The primary focus of the club is to provide recreational sailing opportunities as well as competitive sailing.

Society of Physics Students

Students interested in the study of physics, the application of physical principles in daily life, and careers in physics are invited to join the Society of Physics Students.

SoundBoard

SoundBoard provides regular opportunities for Lawrence students, alumni and local acts to perform on campus. The group is dedicated to encouraging and promoting composition and performance.

Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC)

SAAC promotes athletics at Lawrence. Members are usually drawn from among those students who participate in intercollegiate athletics, but membership is open to all interested students. SAAC encourages fan support, arranges pep rallies and transportation to games, raises funds to support the athletic program, and encourages involvement in athletics.

CLUBS AND ORGANIZATIONS

Student Organization for University Programming (SOUP)

Organized to address a broad range of campus programming, SOUP presents dances, concerts, lectures, novelty and variety performers, and coordinates major campus events during Fall Festival and Mardi Gras. It also presents the "Big Event," usually a concert featuring a nationally recognized artist or performing group.

Student Produced Amateur Musicals @ LU (SPAMALU)

SPAMALU's purpose is to provide students with an opportunity to participate in any aspect of a Broadway musical production. Each year, SPAMALU produces a show involving student actors, dancers, musicians, set and costume designers, technical personnel, etc.

Student Working Against Hunger and Poverty (SWAHP)

Affiliated with the National Student Campaign Against Hunger and Homelessness, SWAHP holds educational programs and promotes volunteer action to address hunger and homelessness in the local community and beyond. The group annually hosts the Feinstein Challenge on campus, collecting thousands of food items for local food pantries and bringing together campus groups, individual students, and children from several local elementary schools in the process. Membership is open to all interested Lawrentians.

Students for Sensible Drug Policy (SSDP)

SSDP looks at policies affecting drugs through a rational perspective and seeks to make a positive change on policy through education and lobbying.

Students of Lawrence Studio (SOL Studio)

SOL Studio provides pre-professional recording for any Lawrence student who has original material he or she wishes to record.

Sustainable Lawrence University Garden Club (SLUG)

SLUG was formed to support and sustain Lawrence's organic garden and to provide a link between students and the Organic Garden Council. The club studies organic farming and gardening, assists with garden maintenance, and provides information and educational programming to the campus and community. Produce is sold to and utilized by Bon Appétit Dining Services.

Tropos: Campus Literary Magazine

Student creative writing, essays, poetry, photography and other art are compiled annually in this magazine.

Ultimate Frisbee (men and women)

Ultimate Frisbee is a fall and spring club sport and each season the team travels to several tournaments throughout the Midwest. The sport is fast-paced and fun and all skill levels are welcome. The men's team is known as SiM (Soft in the Middle) and the women's team competes as VICI.

VITAL Tutoring (Volunteers in Tutoring at Lawrence)

The VITAL tutoring program is operated through the Volunteer and Community Service Center and matches Lawrence students with children from local schools for content and general tutoring on a regular basis. Most tutoring occurs on the Lawrence campus in common areas such as the Seeley G. Mudd Library.

iVIVA! Latin American Students Organization

This club was organized for the exploration of the Latin American experience, to help support the Latino community by developing lifelong bonds filled with laughter, cultural awareness and a sense of community. It is open to all students and provides a setting in which to understand and share culture, traditions and the experience unique to Hispanic Americans.

Wellness Committee

The Wellness Committee welcomes students, faculty and staff members interested in healthy, balanced living through use of the wellness model. The group plans educational and awareness programs and assembles campus resources to focus attention on leading a balanced lifestyle. Dimensions of wellness include physical, psychological, social, emotional, spiritual and vocational aspects.

WLFM: Internet Radio Station

Opportunities for student-initiated Internet broadcasting are available through WLFM. The broadcast format accommodates a variety of musical genres as well as public interest, multicultural and sports programming. WLFM also plays host to the Annual Midwest Trivia Contest, held in January each year since 1965. Studios are located in the Music-Drama Center.

Women's Ice Hockey Club

The Women's Ice Hockey Club plays competitive ice hockey throughout the year, practicing at the Appleton Family Ice Arena. It competes both locally and regionally. Players are required to supply some of their own equipment.

Wriston Art Collective

The Wriston Art Collective focuses on and promotes the visual arts on campus. Each term members plan a trip to visit galleries, museums or presentations in the Midwest. It holds an annual art auction where students can sell original work and sponsors displays of student artwork on campus.

Intercollegiate Athletics

Lawrence offers a variety of varsity sports for women and men. Most of the training facilities are located at Alexander Gymnasium. The university provides transportation between the main campus and the gym on a regular schedule during practice and competition periods.

WELLNESS AND RECREATION

The Buchanan Kiewit Wellness Center combines student Health and Counseling Services with recreational, leisure and fitness programs, making this a one-stop resource center. The facility offers a cardiovascular exercise room and a weight room featuring Life Fitness equipment, racquetball courts, a gymnasium with an elevated, four-lane jogging track, and Olympic-size swimming pool. Lawrence students regularly participate in a variety of activities such as fencing, ballet, jogging, basketball, volleyball, weight training, badminton and water polo. Students, faculty and staff can also participate in activities such as intramurals, Pilates, yoga, taijutsu, basketball and more!

Lawrence University Community Council (LUCC)

Lawrence University Community Council is the student governing body at Lawrence. The council has authority to legislate policies affecting non-curricular campus concerns. The president and vice president are elected through all-campus elections in which students and faculty may vote. Cabinet members are appointed by the president and vice president subject to approval by the council. Students have representation on the council through 14 representatives elected by students within defined residential areas. Faculty members collectively appoint three representatives.

HONOR SOCIETIES

Lambda Sigma

A national honor society for sophomore men and women, Lambda Sigma fosters leadership, scholarship, fellowship and the spirit of service among college students. Typically members usher at convocations, babysit during faculty meetings and sponsor social events on campus.

Mortar Board

A national honor society for senior men and women, Mortar Board elects members at the end of their junior year on the basis of outstanding leadership, scholarship and service to the academic community.

Phi Beta Kappa

The Lawrence chapter elects as members, senior students who have demonstrated superior scholarship. The society sponsors lecturers and awards scholastic honors for academic performance in the freshman and junior years.

Pi Kappa Lambda

In 1918, a number of faculty members in the school of music at Northwestern University were concerned that their students were not eligible for election to Phi Beta Kappa, so they created a similar organization for music students. Election to Pi Kappa Lambda represents the highest honor for music majors; it is reserved for students who have demonstrated exceptional achievement in both musicianship and scholarship.

FORMING A NEW CAMPUS ORGANIZATION

Students may want to form a new organization to explore and share with other students those interests that are not reflected in existing campus organizations. The professional staff of the Campus Life Office can provide advice and support to further the growth of new organizations.

Specific areas of support may include the following:

- 3 Organizational structure, budgeting, fund raising and official recognition through LUCC
- 4 University and local resources that may support the new organization
- 5 Assistance contacting prospective members and prospective advisors
